Beef-Forage Show And Tell

B eef cow-calf producers are invited to a show and tell program on April 17, 6:15 pm at Mark Harmon's just north west of Stotts City. The program will feature talks on how technology can be used to enhance of a relatively small cow herd.

Mark will explain his day-to-day management practices that include soil testing, forage testing, the use of new forage species, heat synchronization along with artificial insemination.

Assisting in those discussions will be Ernie and Tammy Wallace, Stotts City who do the heat synch and AI practices and Stan Lock, Republic. Ted Dahlstrom, DVM, Monett will outline herd health practices he helps with and Tim Schnakenberg, University of Missouri Extension agronomy specialist will talk about forage production, especially annual rye grass in a grazing system.

The "show" part will be most impressive as the attendees will see the differences in the calves born last fall from a proven Genex sire and a very good cleanup bull. Annual rye grass will also be a part of the show.

The program is a joint effort of University of Missouri Extension and the Southwest Missouri Cattlemen's Association.

The location is north of Stotts City on highway 97, one mile, then west on Lawrence county 2110 two miles to Lawrence county 1040.
