Davis of Davis Farm Supply Incorporated has worked with farm equipment his entire career. He was one of the early members of the River Hills Antique Tractor Club. "It gets in your blood but, I love it. I have met so many people. I always take time to talk about antique tractors. Each tractor has a story," he said.

Davis his two sons and three grandsons have two sheds stocked with 20 tractors, various examples of antique farming equipment and a 1939 Ford Ferguson, a surprise Christmas gift from his family. Christmas 2009 was, "one of the best," added Davis. He is currently looking for his grandfather's original tractor. "I have the serial number memorized but I do keep it written down in my wallet. One of these days I will find it," he said.

The tractor Davis is searching for is a 1959 Ford 961. The serial number is 26371. It was bought new by his grandfather, Ira Heinbockel on May 4, 1959. Hopefully, a reader will help Davis find his grandfather's tractor.

The recent 11th Annual Tractor Adventure Ride, one of many events sponsored by the club, had over 150 tractors along for the ride. Although tractors must be at least 40 years old and be able to maintain a speed of 10 mph to participate in the adventure, the oldest tractor making the 32 mile ride through the countryside of eastern Perry County, Missouri was a 1937 John Deere A owned by Steve Maurer of Elkville, Illinois. Antique tractors from Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky and Missouri began and ended the tractor adventure at the Altenburg Fairgrounds. Following the antique tractor adventure participants enjoyed a fish fry, a drawing for prizes and storytelling.

Roy Lohmann of Perryville, Missouri has a story. He remembers when his grandfather bought a brand new 1945 Farmall B. "It was a big event. Even though I was only four years old, I can still remember that day. It was the first tractor on our farm that had rubber tires, Lohmann. For over 20 years, his 1945 Farmall B was the main tractor used for corn cultivation on the family farm.

Lohmann's son, Todd, is the 4th generation of Lohmann to drive the 1945 Farmall B. While Roy drove the 1945 Farmall B in the River Hills Antique Tractor Club's 11th Annual Tractor Adventure Ride, Todd drove his 1963 Massey Ferguson 65. Roy hopes to one day see his granddaughter, Grace, become the 5th generation Lohmann to drive the 1945 Farmall B.

There is the story about two boys from Illinois who five or six years ago, spotted a Case tractor at an antique tractor show in Missouri. The conversation went something like this. Where did you get it? Who did you buy it from? Was his name . . .? That's my dad!!! Needless to say the two boys bought the tractor, hid it, planned a tractor ride and begged their dad to go with them. Sunday, tractor ride day came. Dad doesn't want to go; he doesn't have a tractor anymore. The boys told their dad they had a tractor for him, he could drive that 'old Case'. Dad walked up to the tractor, started to get on and stopped still in his boots. He was shocked to discover this 'old Case' was actually his original
